I am delighted to introduce the Shadow Players in our debut production. As one of the founders of the Chinese Universities Shakespeare Festival I have been conscious of the abundant dramatic talent of the Hong Kong students taking part in the Festival over recent years and keen to see that talent nurtured for the enrichment of theatrical life in

Hong Kong. A little over a year ago my gifted young CUHK English Department colleague Professor Julian Lamb and I met with a small group of HKU and CUHK graduates and alumni of the Shakespeare Festival and we decided to form a theatre company. There are existing theatre companies in Hong Kong, of course, but the group saw the need for a new company of young local actors committed to putting on classic and high-quality contemporary plays in English to delight, stimulate and challenge Hong Kong audiences and students. Having attended Hong Kong schools themselves, the Players are inspired by a strong sense of mission to bring their skill and passion to secondary school students, especially those studying English and dramatic arts, across the territory.

Director's Note

The Learned Ladies of Mid-Levels: an "Opera for Spoken Voice"

I began with the simple premise that each character had a leitmotif – a short musical theme – and from there grew the idea that each character had one or more "arias," speeches which were timed very precisely with music based on their leitmotif. Hence the term, "opera for spoken voice." These arias appear at moments when a scene reaches a level of emotional intensity, or when a character is self-consciously performing something (for instance, a poem). And when combined with explicitly poetic language, the play achieves a playful and charming non-realism. We believe this use of music in theatre is something that most audiences would not have encountered before. It will be one of the hallmarks of subsequent Shadow Players productions to perform the classics of western theatre in innovative ways such as this.

That Molière himself was aware of the power of music to achieve these effects is in little doubt. He collaborated on numerous occasions with composers Jean-Baptiste Lully and Marc-Antoine Charpentier, and with the former developed the hybrid genre, les comédies-ballets. Our own musical collaborator, Camille Saint-Saëns, has provided us with a piece of music full of theatrical possibility. Carnival of the Animals not only contains memorable melodies, but music which suggests movement and mannerisms, gestures and postures. Steven Bailey has adapted Saint-Saëns' music for us, giving each piece a sense of the character it represents.

I have been asked many times what relevance Molière has to us in 21st century Hong Kong. I find myself having to say that our production does not make Moliere relevant: he simply is relevant. The Learned Ladies of Mid-Levels is concerned with the difference between true learning and mere pedantry, with the right a parent has in determining the course of their child's life, with the rights of women to equitable levels of education, with the importance of family, and with the relative values of academic learning and practical wisdom. We surely live in a thoughtless and gullible society if these concerns are not of relevance to us. But perhaps the clearest sign of the play's relevance is that it makes us laugh. Humour relies on forms of recognition and empathy which comprise a deep and presiding relevance. If we laugh at something it means we have understood it at a very deep level. The proof of the pudding is in the eating: we hope our play makes you laugh.

About The Director

Julian Lamb is Assistant Professor of English at the Chinese University of Hong Kong where he teaches several drama courses. He has taught drama for nearly 17 years at secondary and tertiary levels. He has directed and acted in several plays including Albee's The Zoo Story, Sartre's No Exit, and a staged adaptation (with Steven Bailey) of Eliot's The Waste Land. He has directed CUHK's entry in the Chinese Universities Shakespeare Festival for the last 5 years, and in 2010 directed the winning entry.



Synopsis

Molière's outrageous farce about pedantry and power is brought to life in a context that all Hong Kongers will recognise: the Mid-levels. Unable to distinguish intellectual snobbery from true learning, the ladies of a Mid-levels household are under the spell of C.Y. Tang, a pompous and affected intellectual fraud. Against her husband's wishes, the mother of the house desires her youngest daughter, Henriette, to marry C.Y. Tang. But Henriette's heart is set on Sebastian, a man of practical learning. Will the mother ever see C.Y. Tang for who he truly is? Will Henriette be allowed to marry her Sebastian? Will these learned ladies of the Mid-levels ever learn what true learning is?



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Cast

Joyce Cece Chan as Henriette

Cece graduated with honours from CUHK with a BA in English. During this time, she was awarded Outstanding Actress and Champion Team with her performance as Olivia in Twelfth Night in the Shakespeare Festival. In 2010, she directed and performed in an original modern comedy, The Musical of Errors, earning a college award for creativity. She continued on a scholarship to study at the University of South Australia in 2011, achieving Distinctions in Musical and Theatrical Performance, and completing projects in scriptwriting and filmmaking. Her love for classical theatre came at a young age, with leading roles as Beatrice in Much Ado About Nothing, Sebastian in Twelfth Night, Ophelia in Shakespeare's Shorts, as well as performances in A Midsummer Night's Dream, Macbeth, and The Importance of Being Ernest. She currently teaches and assists with productions at a local youth theatre.



Rosalind Wong as Justine

Rosalind Wong is a BA&BEd graduate from HKU, and is currently a postgraduate at HKU's Comparative Literature Department. Rosalind is the director (and sometimes actress) of the HKU Shakespeare Festival Team since 2010. She is the recipient of the Outstanding Actress Award in the 7th Chinese Universities Shakespeare Festival and the Hong Kong School Drama Festival. Acting credits include A Midsummer Night's Dream, Shakespeare's Shorts, Twelfth Night, Much Ado About Nothing, Metamorphosis and The Musical of Errors. Recent directing credits include Hamlet, Romeo and Juliet, As You Like it and Much Ado About Nothing. She enjoys teaching English and drama to young people in her leisure time.

Christopher Tsui as Sebastian

Christopher is a fresh graduate from CUHK, majoring in English. A theatre enthusiast, he has written, directed and performed in various plays during primary and secondary school. In 2010, he performed in a major school musical with songs from Fame, as lead actor and singer. In university, he wrote and directed the winning play of the 2011 CUHK Andrew Parkin Drama Cup. At the 8th Chinese Universities Shakespeare Festival (2012), he won Best Actor for his portrayal of the title character in Coriolanus. He has also worked as a teaching assistant at Shakespeare4All in drama workshops for primary and secondary school students.




Francis Chan as Bernice




Eugenia Lee
